This is an example of the room decorations. A very nice touch.




Views from the lodge.













One of our day trips took us north to a town called Lunenburg. Little did we know the history of this area, as ship building has been its main industry for many years.

To the right is an image of a sign taken while we were at lunch one day. It mentions "The Bounty" which is the ship built for Metro Goldwyn Mayer, to be used in the movie classic "Munity on the Bounty" as well as being filmed as "The Black Pearl" in the more recent "Pirates of the Caribbean" movies.

Smith and Rhuland Shipyard

In 1899, Richard W. Smith inherited his father's shipyard on the Lunenburg waterfront. In 1900, he formed the Smith and Rhuland shipyard with George A. Rhuland.

The firm grew rapidly under the direction of the two partners. Richard Smith had worked for several years with his father and other shipbuilders. George Rhuland had served his apprenticeship with the firm of Young and Morash. As other Lunenburg shipyards closed, the work of building schooners and other vessels was undertaken by the partnership. The most famous of their vessels was the original "Bluenose".

The Smith and Rhuland Shipyard became the best known of the Lunenburg shipyards, and operated until the 1970's. During that time, they constructed more than 270 vessels, three replicas and many smaller boats.

Their replicas included the "Bounty" (1960), "Bluenose II" (1963), and the "Rose" (1970). Smith and Rhuland's shipyard was purchased by Scotia Trawler Limited in 1970's. Vessel repairs are still conducted at the shipyard.

Lunenburg, Nova Scotia

Here is some good information on the famous ship "Bluenose" of which we have a model on our mantel.

Designed by William Roué and built by Smith and Rhuland, *Bluenose* was launched at Lunenburg, Nova Scotia on March 26, 1921, and christened by Audrey Marie Smith. She was built to be a racing ship and fishing vessel, in response to the defeat of the Nova Scotian Fishing Schooner *Delawana* by the Gloucester, Massachusetts in 1920, in a race sponsored by the *Halifax Herald* newspaper.

After a season fishing on the Grand Banks of Newfoundland, *Bluenose* defeated *Elsie* (out of Gloucester), returning the International Fishermen's Trophy to Nova Scotia. In 1930, off Gloucester, Massachusetts, she was defeated 2–0 in the inaugural Sir Thomas Lipton International Fishing Challenge Cup by perhaps her most celebrated competitor, the Gertrude L. Thebaud. However, over the next 17 years of racing, no challenger, American or Canadian, could wrest the International Fishermen's Trophy from her.

She was no mere racing ship, but also a general fishing craft that was worked hard throughout her lifetime. She fished cod and other kinds of groundfish, and at least once won competitions for largest catches of the season and similar awards.

The other three shots are simply some of the camera in his collection. Notice the size of the one in the lower left as compared to Linda standing in front of it.






Shelburn, NS



Flames consume the lodge at the White Point Beach Resort, a well-known tourist destination outside of Liverpool, N.S. (Twitter) The main lodge at the popular and historic White Point Beach Resort on Nova Scotia's south shore was destroyed by fire Saturday. John Leefe, mayor of the Region of Queens Municipality, said he first heard about the fire around 2:30 p.m. The fire was still burning Saturday evening.

"The building, from anecdotal information I'm getting, may well be a total loss," Leefe said. RCMP Staff Sgt. Jeff Wells said all staff and guests had been counted and there were no injuries. He said it's too early to say what the cause of the fire was, but he said it spread quickly because the building was a wooden structure and there were strong winds. Wells estimated eight to 10 fire departments, possibly up to 60 firefighters, came to fight the fire in the main lodge, which was fully engulfed in flames. He said he believed firefighters would be there overnight.

The lodge housed guest rooms, a dining room, a kitchen, a conference centre and a swimming pool. A wedding was scheduled Saturday evening. He said some guests stayed and others had to be relocated. "There's still power to the majority of the resort," Wells said. "However the main building is shut down and is a loss." According to its website, White Point Beach Resort began as a private hunting and fishing lodge in 1928 and has had several expansions since it opened.

The lodge housed the dining room, conference centre, kitchen and swimming pool. (Matthew Wheelans/Twitter) The resort employs 175 people and Leefe called it a huge blow to the region, which is already dealing with tourism woes and a possible shutdown of the Bowater Mersey Paper Co. Ltd. mill. In June, the province gave the resort a \$1 million from it's soon-to-be-scrapped Industrial Expansion Fund to increase marketing and to make upgrades to its infrastructure. The loan is valid for 10 years and carries an interest rate of 5.5 per cent. The resort was kicking in another \$400,000 to improve rooms and recreation facilities. Work was scheduled to begin in January 2012.

Leefe said it's not clear what will happen now. The resort is a popular tourist destination in Nova Scotia.

Three months have passed following the devastating fire on November 12, 2011 that destroyed White Point Beach Resort's Main Lodge. Owner Robert Risley along with his team at White Point beamed with pride today as they shared the design of the new Main Lodge to be constructed over the next several months and readied for opening in Fall 2012.

Inspired and energized by the overwhelming outpouring of support from White Pointers, Robert says he knew the new lodge would have to recapture that familiar, comfortable feeling of the White Point we remember so well. "As we had hoped, with more than 100 submissions online, White Pointers came forth with their suggestions for our new Lodge. It was reassuring to know many of the thoughts for the Lodge, reflected our own." says Risley.

In early January, the Resort's Management Team, joined by the local design team of WHW Architects, Design 360, and J.W. Lindsay Enterprises; gathered to get the planning underway leading to today's announcement.

"It gives me great pleasure to present the design of our new Lodge." says Risley, "It truly captures the essence of the former Lodge, yet is distinctive and original, a perfect tribute to be enjoyed for many generations."

Like the original, the new lodge will be sustainably constructed with local, natural materials, such as wood and stone. With modern windows, insulation and efficient mechanical and electrical systems, the new lodge will have a smaller ecological footprint, using much less water and energy than the old building.

The building's internal features provide all the amenities of the original, and more. On the main level, guests will be welcomed into a reception area with soaring ceilings and stunning views of the ocean. Everyone will be drawn to the Lodge's new heart: the warmth of twin wood burning, stone fireplaces surrounded with comfortable seating for relaxing.

Accessibility enhancements will welcome guests on each of its two levels. Its orientation will maximize passive solar heating and provide wonderful views of the beach from all areas. Oceanside decks with overhead trellises will provide protected areas to relax and enjoy the beautiful oceanfront sights and sounds of the Atlantic Ocean.

The upper level includes a lounge, 3,000 square foot divisible meeting and convention room with a wood burning fireplace and a 3,000 square foot dining room also with a fireplace, both served by a new, modern commercial kitchen.

The lower level will feature an indoor pool, hot tub and sauna, fitness centre, games room and "kids' zone". Spaces also include a spa and two barrier-free guest rooms, all with signature White Point views. The building pays homage to the original with hipped roofs and deep protective overhangs reminiscent of the iconic White Point beach umbrellas. The brightly coloured red roof with twin projecting stone chimneys will be a beacon for guests strolling the beach or teeing off on the 6th hole.

White Point's General Manager, Danny Morton, echo's Risley's pride. Morton says the new Lodge design continues the great traditions of White Point. "The Design Team has done an amazing job capturing the essence of White Point while providing optimal flexibility of the spaces enabling us to meet the needs of our guests. Our White Point team looks forward to welcoming White Pointers back to the beach to celebrate and enjoy many more great days."

With an anticipated opening in the late Fall of 2012, construction is expected to begin in early April at a cost of just over \$4 million. White Point is a favourite year-round oceanfront beach destination for vacationers and meeting delegates on the South Shore of Nova Scotia. While the 84 year old main property is closed until the Fall for the new Lodge construction, the eleven RCI Gold Crown Vacation Cottages and two Executive Vacation Homes are open throughout 2012.
